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# The Bamboo Beacon Newspaper American Community School Saigon, South Vietnam

The Bamboo Beacon was the first newspaper (following the former newsletter The Foxy Chronicle) of the American Community School. The first issue was published on Friday September 15, 1961. It continued to be published every two weeks during the school year, until the school's closing in 1965. The newspaper reported school news, social events, sports, a book corner, feature articles about South Vietnam, original poems, and humor.

Originally The Foxy Chronicle and Bamboo Beacon circulation included only the High School (grads 9-12). In November 1961, subscriptions were extended to the  $7^{th}$  and  $8^{th}$  grades, and their representatives were invited to join the staff.

The Bamboo Beacon usually consisted of six double columned pages. The copy was typed and run off by hand on the school's ditto duplicator.

The name Bamboo Beacon was selected by the staff in hopes the name would symbolize to the students a staunch light ever ready to serve them.

This book contains copies of the original Bamboo Beacon newspapers, saved by Burton Parker, who served on the staff.



for have no load, if you have been down town in Saigon recently, erolds of people milling around down by City Hall. It is a display of Viet Cong arms captured in the "Dong Tien" operation in July. Out of sheer curiosity I went in. The police only let in about 300 people at one time so when it was my turn I stumbled along with the rest of them.

Along the walls on either side are pictures of the battles, the capturing of many enemy officials and of the mutilated bodies of both sides. All these with a little cards near by telling what is happening in Vaetnamese, French, and fluent 17 th century frelish.



#### THE TOOK CORTEGE

To introduce our book corner, we thought it would be interesting to give you a brief history of books. The modern book is such a familiar object in our lives that we never stop to wonder about its beginnings or to realize that books are the result of centurys of development Indeed, there was a time when there were no books at all and stories and legends were passed on by word of mouth and wandering bands and ministrate sarg or told tales of hereism and adventure.

The first books were not rockly books at all but tablets of clay, stone, motal or wood. Authorities consider the first "book" to have been written about 2650 B. G. on rolls of papyrus. Papyrus was made from a plant found in water and was cheap and easy to process. For this reason, it was widely used to make sheet which then were pasted together to form a long, continous roll fastened to cinde of wood, ivery, or bone and tightly rolled. Papyrus rolls were of various length but the dangest known one measured 135ft in length and was 17 in high! You can see why those were hard to handle. For this reason, scrolls were abandoned and aquare sheetswere used, stitched together and bound. They probably originated in Greece or the Far East. The komans had still another kind of book. They coated wooden boards with dark colored wax on which they scratched the wood showed through. They called these

Many different materials were used to make the earliest books—papyrus, leather, wood, ivery, bronze, and other metals, parchent made from sheep's

skins. Vellum is a beautiful and lasting material but very expensive. It was not until the tenth century A.D. that paper, made from linen rags, was introduced to Furne from Asia.

Barly books ore hand written, usually by nonks, and cuned only by the wealthiest class because of the cost. Then, in 1041 A.D., movable type was invented in China and in Europe in 1440 A.D. This in cention made it possible to produce books on a large scale at reasonable prices. The first great book was printed in 1456 A.D. and wasthe "GUT INSING LIBLIU".

#### VIETNAM

During the past few months headlines back in the States have ranted and raved about the "Red Attack Feared in South Vietnam".

The people back home are naturally worried. I keep receiving letters from friends and relatibes asking me when I'm coming home. They keep wanting to know what's happening and if it's as bad as the newspapers make it to be.

Well, what I gather from what I've read is that although the, the editors don't agree on a specific date, they do seem to stick to two me in points. The first is that the Communists will try to set up a rival government to Diem's in northern South Vietnam; and the second is that the invasion will come from both the Laos and North Vietnamese borders. Ome rticle, by Fred S. Hoffman, said that the Communist guerillas were bringing men and supplies into Vietnam over the five main trails from Lacs and also from a big base in "neutral" C mbodia. On the other hand, he says that the U.S. has just stepped up its f ow of communications gear and othe aids to help ward off the "rash o Communist raids."

In another article, R bert S. Allen and Paul Scott stated that Ho Chi Minh's 300,000 man army ( compar d to Diem's probable 170,000 man army was now armed with the latest Sov et equipment, i.e., heavy artillery and rocket-firing guns. They also said that if nothing happens between Septimber 17, the date of the national elections in West Germany, and October 21, he opening of the Soviet Communist Part Congress in Moscow, nothing will happ n for at least three or four month

From all these sours and the many runors, it sounds as if something is going to happen after the rainy season is over. According to these same sources, it doesn't seem that the situation can stay as uncertain as it is much longer, but as one expert said, in the case of invasion, "I think the South Vietnamese will be in a bad way, but they can hold their own

#### THE BOOK CORNER

We discussed the beginnings of books in our last issue and in this issue we want to tell you som thing of books especially written for child-

ren and young people.

Some of the first Known ooks for children were called "hornboo s" because they were simple little wooden paddles on which were pasted lesson sheets. These sheets were covered with transparent horn and in ceneral were to teach the child his latters. There still exists a little h rnbook supposedly used by Queen Eliz beth. These were not very entertain ng.
Next came the "chapmen", the ped-

dlers of the 17th and 18th ce turies, wit h news sheets and "chapbo ks" sold along with various trink ts. "Chapbooks" were cheap little books that could be bought for as 1 ttle as a penny. They ran from 16 to 32 or 64 pages and usually were not stitched together but merely folded. he stortesortunately, perhaps, writers following were the kind that children h ve always liked - tales of aeven ure and heroes.

At the time, a highly re igious movement was getting underway and out of this came some gloomy chil ren's literature dwelling on death and reli gion. one great book did come out of this Puritan world, John Buny n's (1628-1688) "Pilgrim's Progre s" which is read by children tod y in a modernized, briefer form.

In the New World, hornbo ks were referred to as early as 1646 nd the famous "New England Primer" a peared in Boston around 1691. Again, the emphasis was on the dreary, w th long discussions of tombs and tort res.

It remained for the Fren h to introduce gaiety into childre 's literature and around 1697 the w 11-known "Maries of testines floored appear advibe

These tales soon spread to other countries and other languages and are beloved by chaldren to this day. The "Mother Goose" was printed in England in 1729 and was followed in 1765 by the first juvenile nogel ever written expressly for children "Goody Two Shoes", which supposedly was written by Oliver Goldsmith. Another Famous children's book which emerged from the Puritan era was "Robinson Crusce" by Daniel Defos, published in 1719 when Defos was sixty years of age. In 1726, Jonathan Swift wrote, "Gulliver's Travels " which has been adopted by children although it was intende d

for adults.

Again, the French changed the course of childrenss literature from the sad and morbid with the publication in 1762 of Rousseau's, "Emile". "Emile" was a carefree fellow, the gay companion of his tutor, free of all books exept "Robinson Crusoe". Un-Rousseau turned back to moralizing in children's literature, best exemplifie by a lady named Maria Edgeworth (1767-1849) who wrote some of the first books for children which contained real plots and were first-rate storytelling. Our own American contribution to this kind of children's books was artha Farquharson (1828-1909) who prote 26 volumes about a pious little

hereine the was either fainting or crying continuously, by name of

"Elsie Dinsmore".

And so it is not until 1822 that we come to the first of the modern books for children, gay, entertaining but instructive. Then came many fine books- "A Visit From St. Wicholas" which is known to children everywhere as "The Hight Before Christmas" and in 1865, "Alice's Adventures in Wonder-Tanon

and many others right up to the present day when beautifully illustrated interesting books for young people on e off the presses daily.



# PEAL HARBOR

On Dec. 7, 1941, Sunday, 7:50 AM the U.S. was launched into World War mas Japanese bombers, torpedo-bombers, and Zeros attacked Fearl Harbor in what has been called the most successful surprise attack in history. The succeeding waves of aircraft brought complete confusion to ships and airfields for scores of precious minutes as the men struggled to com prehend the situation. Records are full of accounts of those struggling individua s who fought the seemingly impossible facts that confronted them. A man watched a plane dive from the clouds; make a perfect torpedo approach, drop the torpedo, and bank away. He simply watched the torpedo come in, after all the Navy flyer were just practicing their approaches as they were a few days ago; nothing unusual about what. Then the explosion came; and as he was thrown to the deck hs, still thinking it a practice, yelled, "OH, my GOD! Somebody's gonna git h for this But when the men finally sensed the

gravity of the situation, most, being more confused, dazed, and madder than they had ever been before in their lives fought back as bast as they could. A man stood on the deck of

hen the final Japanese plane flew back to it's air craft carrier it was perfectly possible to understand that the US, was now at war. One just had to look at the smoking ships, merked docks, and demolished airc aftene proud mighty. Pacific

fleet had received a staggering blow it would alaways remember. In just four and one ha f hours the lattleships Arizona, Ok Ihoma and Itah were lost foreveras the destroyers Cassin and Downs 188 plans and 2,000 persons. Over half of this number were killed when Arizona exploded. Out of the war for months were the battleships "West Virginia", "California" and the "levada"; damage d were the battleships, "Tennessee", "Maryland"

"Honolilu", and "Raleigh"; and destroyer "Shaw". The Japanesecpaid for this tramendous victory with only twenty-nine planes lost, one submarine, and five midget submarines; a total of about 129 men! But the Japanese underestimated the United States' power of recovery. Like a stunnedogiant she gathered her strength and fought back. But not until November, 1943, were the Japanese denied the offensive.




